Demand to Relax
Immigration Curb
Rejected by Britain

LONDON, Nov. 27.—The Government refused demands of the Labor Opposition tonight to ease restrictions on immigration from Commonwealth countries into Britain.

Henry Brooke, the Home Secretary, said that applications to enter Britain were being received at a rate of a half million a year. "There must be some effective control," he declared.

Most of the Commonwealth immigrants are West Indian Negroes, Indians and Pakistanis. In 1962 the Conservative Government began issuing permits only to those immigrants who had been promised jobs.

It also instituted checks on their health and character.

Harold Wilson, leader of the Labor party, demanded that Britain reach an agreement with the Commonwealth countries on a quota system. He made the demand as the Commonwealth Immigration Act came up for its annual renewal in the House of Commons.

The Home Secretary said in reply that the West Indian Governments had refused to impose any controls on immigration. "There is not the smallest chance of achieving effective voluntary control," he added.

Mr. Brooke said that between July, 1962, and October, 1963, the Government approved 59,000 of the 319,008 applications from Commonwealth citizens to enter Britain. The country, with a population of about 53 million, has accepted 500,000 Commonwealth immigrants in the last seven or eight years, he added.

Times Service Will Carry
Times of London Articles

Selected articles from the world news report of The Times of London will be included in The New York Times news service in the United States, beginning Monday, Turner Catledge, managing editor of The New York Times, announced yesterday.

The New York Times news service now transmits 20,000 words nightly to its 80 client newspapers in this country, Canada and Europe.

"Now that news resources of Great Britain's oldest newspaper are being made available daily to New York Times news service clients, the effect will be to broaden the news perspective of American readers in a world that seems to get smaller by the hour," Mr. Catledge said.

At least one major interpretive or background story will be transmitted to clients daily, he said. This will be increased if news developments warrant it.

Peru Applies 8% Sales Tax

LIMA, Peru, Nov. 27 (UPI).—A new 8 per cent sales tax went into effect today on foreign and domestic cigarettes, beer and hard liquor and automobiles priced at more than \$5,000. Also affected were imported gasoline, perfumes, shoes, cameras, leather goods, furs, yachts and motorboats.

Boxer Starts Sentence

SELKIRK, Scotland, Nov. 27 (UPI).—Chic Calderwood, former British Empire light-heavyweight boxing champion, surrendered to the police today to begin a three-month term for assault. Calderwood was sentenced here a month ago for having assaulted a man who owed him money.

FREE-TUITION BILLS
TO BE REINTRODUCED

Assemblyman Melville E. Abrams, Democrat of the Bronx, said yesterday that he would reintroduce in the Legislature bills that would decree free tuition in all city colleges of the State University and all New York City public institutions of higher education, including the community colleges.

At the last session the bills were supported by 5,000 college students from various parts of the state and by the alumni associations of City, Hunter, Brooklyn and Queens Colleges and the city Board of Higher Education, Mr. Abrams said.
