I understand your assignment will be an interesting one. I also think it very good for the paper to nail down the precedents of assigning abroad from Local, and vice versa. It helps break down these goddam barriers in the newsroom.

But since each department head is enjoined to safeguard the interests of his staff and his file, I must also say that you have done well abroad, and have \*\*mamm\* also shown steady improvement.
