## HUNGARIAN REDS ORDER TWO U. S. AIDS TO GET OUT

## Must Be Across Border Within 24 Hours

BUDAPEST, Hungary, July 5 (P)—Two American diplomats were ordered expelled from Hungary today by the Red government. They are Albert W. Sherer Jr., legation secretary, who has a wife, Carol, and two small children with him, and Ruth Tryon, head of the United States information service here.

The communist regime used the diplomatic device of holding they were persona non grata [unwelcome] after the United States government rejected a Hungarian claim that they should be withdrawn because of alleged connection with a spy plot.

There is no recourse when a foreign diplomat is declared unwelcome. The two must cross the frontier into Austria within 24 hours—by 1 p. m. tomorrow.

## Services Are Closed

The United States closed its information and music library and documentary film theater here Tuesday on demands of the Hungarian government. The United States voluntarily quit issuing its news bulletin.

Miss Tryon's secretary, Mary Eich, who is on home leave, was barred from returning to Hungary in the note delivered at 1 p. m. today to the American legation.

The diplomatic clash grew out of the recent "spy" trial of Archbishop Jozsef Groesz, who was convicted and now is in prison. The Red regime charged the three Americans indulged in spying and diversionist activities.
